Across the board, the City of Mobile experienced a reduction in crime for the year 2019 in all categories except in its number of homicides. The men and women of the Mobile Police Department remain relentlessly committed to making the community in which you live safer. They are held accountable to do more than patrol their beats, I encourage them to engage and build and maintain relationships with the members of the community as they serve and protect.

As I always say, our department is good at solving crimes but we want to become better at preventing crimes. That is why we depend on you to also remain committed with us to help make

the city a safer place to live, work and play. There have been countless times when we've asked for your help in solving a case —whether it's identifying a suspect or locating a suspect. You delivered. And, we thank you for that. But, let's come together stronger to prevent crimes. Be vigilant. Report any suspicious activity to police.

In 2019, a citizen satisfaction survey was conducted between August 1 and August 30 by researchers at the University of South Alabama. The survey allowed us to gauge Mobilians' perception of crime and safety. In general, 70 percent of citizens believe that Mobile is a safe place. Compared to the city as a whole, 93.4 percent of the respondents said they feel most safe in their specific area of town. While out shopping, 82.5 percent of the respondents said they feel safe. And, 77.2 percent said they feel safe in downtown Mobile.

Let us continue showing progress for a safer community.

In 2019, the Mobile Police Department was budgeted for 507 sworn officers. The actual number was 482. The department was staffed with a total of 225 civilian employees.

Grants Awarded

For the 2019 fiscal year, the Mobile Police Department was awarded \$4.5 million in grant funding from 29 separate grant programs and awards. Most of the grant allocations are used to purchase equipment and fund overtime pay for officers, although other grant programs were specifically awarded. Some of the grants are three-year grants. The 2019 grant fiscal year is October 1, 2018 to September 30, 2019.





















Precinct 1 Crime Data





Number of Calls for Service in 2019 – 42,225 Number of Calls for Service in 2018 – 46,546

In the First Precinct, there was a drop in robberies by 37 percent and burglaries by 23 percent. Larceny crimes decreased by 17.5 percent and aggravated assaults decreased by nearly 13 percent. Also, there was a 29 percent drop in vehicle theft crimes.

Precinct 2 Crime Data





Number of Calls for Service in 2019 – 44,482 Number of Calls for Service in 2018 – 48,468

The Second Precinct experienced a decrease in robberies by nearly half, at 47 percent, compared to last year. The number of burglaries was reduced by 24 percent and vehicle thefts dropped by 32 percent. There was an 11 percent jump in aggravated assaults.

Precinct 3 Crime Data





Number of Calls for Service in 2019 – 41,367 Number of Calls for Service in 2018 – 39,784

In the Third Precinct, there was no change in the number of assaults from year to year. There was a 25 percent decrease in robbery crimes. Larceny dropped by 16 percent, and vehicle thefts were reduced by 27 percent. Burglaries only increased by 8.5 percent.

Precinct 4 Crime Data







Number of Calls for Service in 2019 – 49,203 Number of Calls for Service in 2018 – 51,105

In the Fourth Precinct, the number of robberies went down 18 percent, compared to 2018. A significant drop was seen in the number of burglaries, nearly 28 percent, and vehicle thefts, 38 percent. Larceny crimes dropped by 14 percent and aggravated assault crimes dropped by 3 percent.

In 2019, the Fourth Precinct had the highest volume in calls for service.

Number of Calls for Service in 2019 – 9,130





Homicide Data

With a total of 40 criminal homicide cases and 12 unsolved, that puts the Mobile Police Department **homicide clearance rate at 70 percent**.

As far as motive, most of the homicides occurred due to an altercation, followed by drug-related and domestic-related reasons.


Citizen Complaints

There were 65 citizen complaints filed during 2019 and cited 102 areas of concern. Of the 102 areas of concern cited, 64 percent were found to contain proper conduct by the officers and 17 percent were found to contain improper conduct.
