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A MESSAGE FROM THE

CHIEF OF POLICE

At the onset of 2022, the Mobile Police Department implemented its crime-reducing strategic plan which primarily consists of three main focuses: Intelligent-Led Policing, Community Engagement, and Standards of Excellence. There is little doubt that our collective efforts have been a huge success. We realized a 5% percent reduction in all Part I Crimes, and more than 10 % percent reduction in violent crime compared to that of 2021.

However, a closer look at each violent category, on its own, was even more significant as we were virtually double digits down in every category of violent crime. Unfortunately, we did experience a large uptick in catalytic converter thefts which ultimately drove our larceny numbers. This was not only problematic for the City



of Mobile but was also an issue nationwide. I am pleased to tell you that with significant arrests of the suspects committing those offenses we are now still trending down as it regards catalytic converter thefts.

There was a lot of additional efforts that supplemented our strategic plan such Operation Echo Stop as well as the passing of Aniah's law, which will no doubt contribute further to reducing crime as we push to keep violent recidivist offenders off our streets. We are most appreciative for the community engagement and the willingness of our citizens coming forward with information.

Although we were very successful in 2022, there is more work that must be done. We will continue our efforts and build on those successes of 2022. We will also continue pushing for trust and transparency within our community. It cannot be overstated the inherent need for partnering with you – the community. Together, we will stand against the violence in our community and will NOT tolerate the senseless violence perpetrated amongst our citizens, particularly our youth. As I always say, if you see something say something, and together we can accomplish the mission of making the City of Mobile the safest city in America with respect for everyone.

GRANTS AWARDED

For the 2022 fiscal year, the Mobile Police Department was awarded \$12.9 million in grant funding for 26 separate grant programs and awards. Most of the grants allocations are used to purchase equipment and fund overtime pay for officers, although other grant programs were specifically awarded.

The 2022 grant fiscal year is October 1, 2021 to September 30, 2022.

10-YEAR CRIME REPORT

Since 2017, total Part I Crime has been trending downward. From 2021 to 2022, crime decreased by 4.8%. Although there was a slight increase in larceny crimes, there was a reduction in all other crimes.

The following graphs show the city's crime trends at a glance over the past decade.
























PRECINCT 1 CRIME DATA

Overall, Precinct 1 had a 2.9% decrease in Part I Crimes.


PRECINCT 2 CRIME DATA

Overall, Precinct 2 had a 8.2% decrease in Part I Crimes.


PRECINCT 3 CRIME DATA

Overall, Precinct 3 had a **0.6% decrease** in Part I Crimes.


PRECINCT 4 CRIME DATA

CENTRAL PRECINCT CRIME DATA





HOMICIDE DATA

85.37% CLEARANCE RATE

For 2022, the Mobile Police Department's homicide clearance rate is 85.37%. There were a total of 41 homicide cases with 35 of those being cleared by arrest or exceptionally cleared.



The motive for 14 of the homicides was due to an altercation. Domestic (8), robbery (2) and drugs (4) were other motives. The motive is unknown for 3 of the homicides.

Ten homicides fall into the other category. In these cases, the person was not the intended target or where the suspect shot into a vehicle. One case in this category was a murder-suicide.

INTERNAL AFFAIRS INVESTIGATIONS

The Internal Affairs Unit conducted a total of 38 investigations involving a total of 51 different members/employees. The investigations included 13 shooting investigations. The dispositions are represented in the following table, which is subdivided by race and gender of the involved officer


Internal Affairs investigations do not imply that a member or employee was complained on individually. An Internal Affairs investigation may be the result of an external complaint against the department, a subunit of the department or individual officers, or the investigation may be initiated from within the department. An Internal Affairs investigation may include more than one member/employee with differing dispositions.

INTERNAL AFFAIRS CITIZEN COMPLAINTS

There were 79 citizen complaints filed during 2022, which cited 199 areas of concern. Of the 199 areas of concern cited, 53% were unfounded, 29% were found to be proper conduct by the officers, 10% were found to contain improper conduct, 6% were still pending (under investigation) at the time of this report.
